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METHODOLOGY

This research was conducted by McGregor Tan from Friday 19th June to Tuesday 7th June 2020.



The objectives of the research were to measure South Australians:

- current perceptions about their health
- their overall level of satisfaction with their life
- the number of times they have visited National Parks,
 Conservation and Recreational Parks over the last twelve months
- which parks they have visited
- the value they place on parks, and
- their familiarity with, and attitudes towards marine parks



Market research has been conducted in accordance with ISO 20252.

The survey was conducted online via invitation and CATI.
Participants were provided with at least 3 reminders to encourage and provide opportunity for participation.

Where possible results have been compared against the June 2018 and June 2019 results.



A sample of 1054 from 196 postcode across all SA NRM regions were surveyed.

Data was weighted by age group and gender by benchmarks derived from the 2016 Census figures.

This survey was distributed through McGregor Tan's online panel.





HEALTH AND WELLBEING

As in past years, respondents in good health were more likely to record a higher life satisfaction rating than those in poorer health.


Those with excellent health had a higher incidence of recording a life satisfaction rating of 10 (37%) or 9 (34%),

Respondents in very good health were more likely to record a 9 (51%) or 8 (49%),

Those in good health had a higher incidence of record a 5-6 (48%),

Those in fair health recorded a life satisfaction rating of 5-6 (18%) or 0-4 (43%), and

Respondents in poor health recorded a rating of 0-4 [16%]







Respondents were allocated to one of eight NRM regions defined by the Department of Environment, Water and Natural Resources in accordance with their residential postcode.








GENERAL HEALTH

Younger respondents aged 18 to 24 (29%) and those with a life satisfaction rating of 9 (34%) or 10 (37%) were more likely to indicate that their health was excellent.

While those aged 75 plus (26%), and respondents with a life satisfaction rating of 0-4 (43%) or 5-6 (18%) had a higher incidence of indicating their health was fair.

Of the 14% of all respondents who indicated they were in fair to poor health, 36% indicated they had a long term health issue or disability.






Respondents aged 75 plus (16%), and those in excellent health (16%) were more likely to have a life satisfaction rating of 10.

Males (20%), those aged 55 to 64 (22%) and respondents in excellent (33%) or very good health (21%) had a higher incidence of recording a life satisfaction rating of 9.

Those who scored a life satisfaction rating of 8 were more likely to be aged 45-54 (39%) or 65-74 (42%) and those in very good health (36%).

While those in fair health were more likely to give a life satisfaction rating of 0-4 [18%] or 5-6 [29%].






