#### Summary

This report has been prepared as part of the South Australian Heritage Committee's programme of evaluating National Estate Items. This item was deferred in December, 1978, pending a broader view of Police Stations within the State. Sufficient information has now been collected to make a comment on this item.

Historically, the Police Station and Courthouse is not very important. It was built twenty-three years after the area was settled, replacing an earlier (1855?) building which later became the Port Lincoln Gaol (now demolished). This building represented the Government's authority in the region.

Architecturally, the Police Station and Courthouse illustrates the formal lines and quality of construction which was typical of the work emerging from the Colonial Architect Office. The building was built from the same plans as the Police Station and Courthouse in Melrose, and this more complete building is already on the Register of State Heritage Items.

Environmentally, the Police Station and Courthouse is an attractive reminder of the Port's early years. Although it is strategically placed near a busy corner, generally it is not visually dominant.

The Integrity of the building is reasonable and it is still being used as a Courthouse. However, many of the alterations are unsympathetic and the original Courtroom fixtures have been removed.

The Port Lincoln Police Station and Courthouse has a Classified Listing from the National Trust and is on the National Estate Register.

## Recommendations

It is recommended that the Police Station and Courthouse, Port Lincoln, be placed on the Register of State Heritage Items, and that it be categorized A2, A3, H3. Features of particular significance are the front and side facades and roof forms.

### HISTORICAL RESEARCH: POLICE STATION AND COURTHOUSE

Port Lincoln was discovered and named by Matthew Flinders in 1802. The area - well-known for its abundant fresh water supply - was frequented by whalers long before the first settlers arrived there in 1839.

Early conflicts with the natives were frequent and the fatal spearing of young Francis Tapley Hawson created a tense and hostile atmosphere which was to continue for many years.

Alexander Tolmer, the energetic trooper and relentless pursuer of criminals, was sent to the Port Lincoln district in May, 1849, with strict orders to establish two outstations there - one near Lake Newlands and the other at Franklin Harbour.

In his reminiscences, Tolmer briefly mentions the 'old' Port Lincoln Police Station (now demolished) which was probably the same building used as the Port Lincoln Gaol, after the new station and courthouse was completed in 1862.

The 'new' building was, in essence, identical to the one built at Melrose and similar to the one at Port Wakefield - the front elevation has a gabled entrance at its centre, flanked by the courthouse and police station wings to its left and right respectively.




# COURT HOUSE, Port Lincoln

Resident Inspector of Police for Eyre Peninsula, Justice of the Peace, and Special Magistrate Henry Holroyd, in reference to the original Court House, in Tasman Terrace, Port Lincoln, wrote in his memoirs: "I reported it unfit for use and after lengthy correspondence I was instructed to choose a convenient site upon which eventually the present handsome court house and other offices were erected. In order to preserve the record I had the year of its erection cut into stone, 1862."

This "handsome court house" now stands on the corner of Washington Street and Adelaide Place, Port Lincoln.


Constructed of local "Duck Pond" limestone, it once had a slate roof but this has been replaced with grey tiles. It is recorded that the building cost £1,086 plus £17 for extras.
