

## SUMMARY

This report is prepared as part of the Heritage Committee's programme of evaluating National Estate items for possible inclusion on the South Australian Register.

Historically, the house, in its earlier form as the blacksmith's shop and residence of Carl Daebler, was associated with the development of Tanunda. However, the blacksmith shop was converted and became an extension to the existing residential section of the building, probably in the late 1870's. This report assesses the building physically as a residence only.

<u>Architecturally</u>, the item is a well preserved example of a worker's cottage, built in stone with concave verandah and cast iron trim.

<u>Environmentally</u>, the house forms a significant part of the main streetscape of Tanunda and is a component of the "gemutuchkeit" generally associated with the German settlement in the Barossa Valley.

The Integrity of the building as a residence is good. No obvious signs of the original function of the blacksmithy remain.

The house is listed on the Register of the National Estate and is on the Classified List of the National Trust.

## RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the house at 24 Murray Street, Tanunda, be included on the Register of State Heritage Items, and that it be categorised A.2, H.3.


## HOUSE AT 24 MURRAY STREET, TANUNDA

The house at 24 Murray Street, Tanunda, was known as Dabeler's (or Daebler's) Blacksmith shop and residence during the 1860's. An 1865 photograph in the Tanunda Historical Society's Archives shows the two distinct functions; the blacksmithy, on the north side, with random stone walls and shingle roof, and the residence with a verandah, rendered or whitewashed walls and some form of sheet metal roofing. Carl Friedrich Franz Daebler held the title to the property in 1867 and his occupation is given on the title as blacksmith. The building could have been constructed some years earlier. The dual function explains the two entrances to what is now a single residence.

In 1879, Daebler sold the property to William Mann, a farmer from Jacob's Creek. It is possible that the changes were made to convert the shop and house to one residence at this time. The roof line was changed from simple gable to hip, a new concave verandah with cast iron brackets was added to the whole front length of building and the stonework was repointed. The house has remained as a private residence since the changes. Subsequent owners were William Mann Junior and Carl von Bertouch until 1920, and Johannes Schultz (a labourer) from 1920 to 1947. The present owner, Arthur Fietz, purchased the property in 1947.
