
POLICE STATION and COURT HOUSE, Goolwa

Goolwa, like most ports, attracted its share of undesirable characters, especially when low water in the river prevented paddle steamers from sailing upstream.

It also boasted hotels which catered for idle river hands and passengers awaiting a berth. To maintain law and order the Goolwa Police Station was built and staffed in 1859.

A National Trust booklet states: "The Police Station and Court House was built in the Australian colonial style with walls of limestone, brick quoins, and roof of slates. Alterations and additions were carried out in 1867. The side windows to the Court House have unusual voussoirs to the circular headed windows, giving a pointed arch effect in the Venetian manner. The roof is now covered with corrugated iron, but the original shaped eave brackets remain."

Inspector Tolmer, then Inspector of Mounted and Rural Police, in August 1840 journeyed to Goolwa and thence to the Coorong to investigate the wreck of the *Maria*. He wrote of Goolwa: "A corporal and two men were specially told off to be left there to form a permanent police station."





Historically the Police Station & Courthouse are linked with the expansion of the Murray River trade and with the development of the South Coast in general. The original section, the Police Station, was constructed in 1859, to the design of E.A. Hamilton, Colonial Architect. The station originally had its own well, and a store for Aborigines (built 1874). The adjoining Courthouse was completed in 1867, using design elements that linked with the architectural features of the Police Station building.



The renovated buildings now house the office and a gallery for the South Coast Regional Arts Centre






FILM 104 NO 4 COURTHOUSE WINDOW DETAIL, EAST WALL


