HISTORICAL RESEARCH: GAWLER MILL, FORMERLY UNION MILL, JULIAN TERRACE, GAWLER

The building now known as the Gawler Mill Restaurant was originally one of three large flour milling concerns flourishing in Gawler during the boom period of wheat growing in the 1860's and 1870's. Severe drought in the early 1880's halted expansion into areas beyond Goyder's rainfall line and wheat acreage declined.

The Union Mill was constructed in 1855 by the brothers George, Henry and William Harrison. In 1856 the mill was three storeys high. Walter Duffield, who had settled in Gawler in 1847, and was already involved in flour milling, purchased the Union Mill in 1863 to work in tandem with his Victoria Mill. A detailed description of the workings of the Union Mill is given in <u>The Gawler Handbook</u> of 1880, by which time the mill was four storeys high and had associated offices, timber yard, weighbridge, blacksmith's shop and forge.

The flour milling firm of Messrs. Duffield & Co. also owned mills in Wallaroo, Snowtown and Port Pirie.

Walter Duffield was an important figure in the history of Gawler. He built his mansion 'Para Para' on the Gawler River in 1862, made wine and entertained visiting royalty there. Duffield was a member of Parliament for a total of eighteen years between 1857 and 1880, during which time he twice served as Treasurer of the State under Premiers Hart and Boucaut. He was a Director of the Bank of South Australia from 1859 to 1873. As well as his milling concerns he also held extensive pastoral interests in the mid-North and west of the State including Koonoona Station merino stud.

Walter Duffield died in 1882 and the Union Mill was sold to the Adelaide Milling Co., a company originally based in Port Adelaide. Fire, a continual hazard in flour mills, gutted the mill in 1914 and when it was rebuilt in 1915 only the central section was finished to four storeys. The front section was left at two storeys. The mill continued to function until about 1917 but increased ease of rail transport, and consolidation of mill ownership meant the centralisation of flour milling and many milling centres like Gawler declined in importance.

The mill buildings underwent some changes when converted to a Restaurant in 1974 but the three upper levels of four storey section have not been altered structurally.
