



This little shop and dwelling, looking like an illustration from Grimm's Fairy Tales, was typical of the quaintness of Hahndorf Main Street, bordered with elms and ash trees, with cottages and shops peeping between. The trees once met overhead to form a leafy shade a mile long, but then had to be lopped back, at first to prevent the branches knocking goods off high-loaded wagons, and later to make way for electricity supply poles.

Mr Christoph, the watchmaker, had his business there in the 1860s. Then for many years it was a cobbler's shop. Adolph Minkwitz made and repaired boots there, and so did a Mr Drute. They used a special cobbler's stool with a hollowed seat which was supported on three sturdy legs. The bootmaker used to fill his mouth with half a packet of tacks, spit them out one at a time, and tap them into place with his little hammer—to the delight of an occasional young audience. Many Hahndorf youngsters had their confirmation boots or shoes made in this shop.


For gardening, the villagers wore wooden clogs made from dried willow wood, with a broad strip of leather across the instep. These were guaranteed to keep feet warm in spite of winter frosts. Clog makers whose names are remembered include Hans Bom, M. Henningson, and Gottlieb Kuchel.

At one time, probably when business was bad, a dressmaker shared the premises with a bootmaker. However, for the past fifty years it has been the village sweets shop, first established by Mrs Post and now owned by her daughter, Mrs Betty Cleggett.


The tea house near by once belonged to Mr Staudenmeyer, the chemist.







S-W ELEVATION








N-E ELEVATION










GROUND THE FLOOR PLAN
