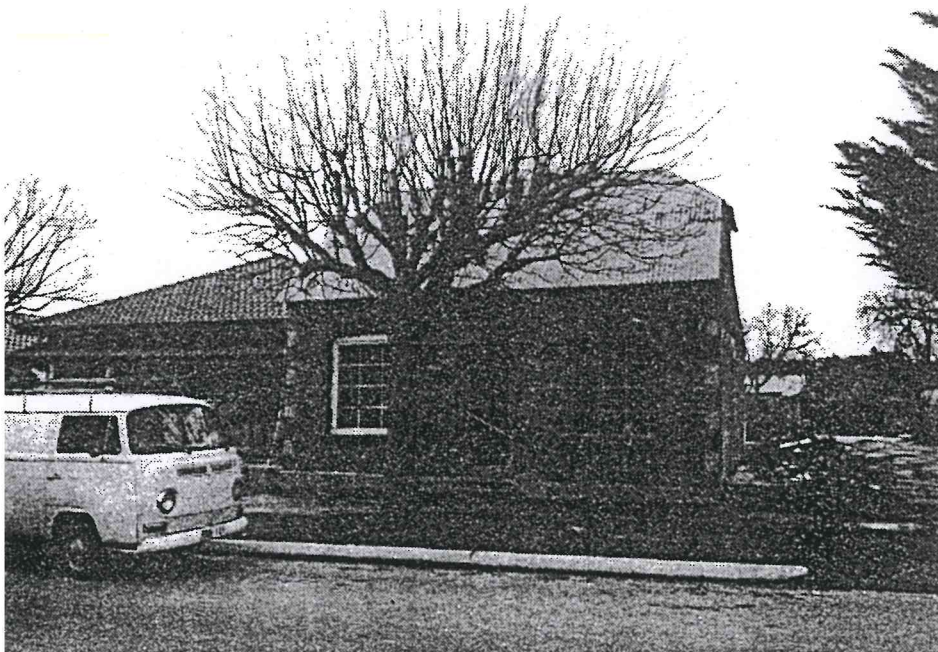
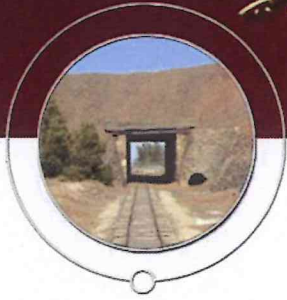

HERITAGE SIGNIFICANCE <p>Formerly undertaker's cottage and business. Original date 1856, owner Carl Rodert.</p> <p>Constructed of stone. Set right on pavement. Half hipped, originally shingled roof still retained under modern galvanised iron roof. Modern verandah.</p> <p>Converted in 1949 into an art gallery by Stefan Heysen, who found cash ledgers dating back to 1847, which suggests that the business first operated from the Rodert residence next door, which has "1847" carved over the door.</p> <p>The Gallery closed in 1953. State Heritage Areas of South Australia



Main Street, Hahndorf State Heritage Places entered in the South Australian Heritage Register.

Today Hahndorf is primarily a residential town, with some commercial and light industrial use mostly confined to Main Street. Even here however, most of these commercial outlets were at one time houses, barns, stables, or a combination of these.

Main Street also contains Hahndorf's larger buildings, such as the three-storey mill at the northern end, St Paul's Lutheran Church to the south, the former Hahndorf Academy and two hotels.

Dwelling, 2005

Dwelling – Schach House 1 Main Street, Hahndorf SHR 13134 – confirmed as a State Heritage Place 14 August 1986

This building probably dates to c1850 and was constructed by J.G. Schach, an early resident of Hahndorf. The building's significance is its architecture, being an example of early half-timbering with pug infill.

St Paul's Lutheran Church 10 Main Street, Hahndorf SHR 13133 – confirmed as a State Heritage Place 14 August 1986

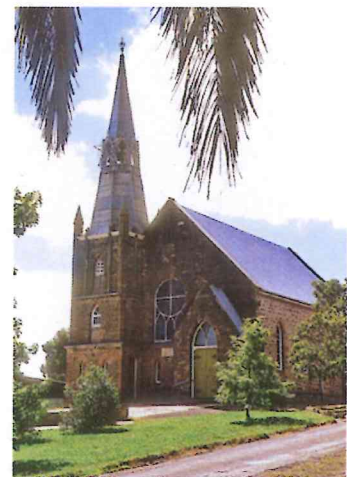
The present St Paul's Lutheran Church, with its distinctive 20-metre belltower, was built in 1890 to commemorate the 50th Anniversary of the first Lutheran church in Australia. It was designed by well-known Adelaide architect F.W. Dancker, and built by D. Both of Eudunda, at a cost of £1,260. The stone was carted from behind the Verdun Hotel, and

the belltower was imported from Germany. This predominantly Gothic-style church replaced a former (1858) St Paul's Church erected in Windsor Avenue.

In 1846, doctrinal differences between Pastor Kavel and Pastor Fritzche saw Hahndorf's population divided into two separate Lutheran churches. Pastor Fritzche and his followers retained the original church property (St Michael's), while Pastor Kavel's group built the small brick church that was the original St Paul's.

Shop (former Morgue)**36 Main Street, Hahndorf****SHR 10506 – confirmed as a State Heritage Place 24 July 1980**

This cottage was built in the 1850s as the mortuary for Hahndorf's undertaker, Carl Rodert, and was one of the first stone buildings in Hahndorf. Almost a century later (1949) Stefan Heysen, son of Sir Hans Heysen, converted it to a public gallery, which was continued from 1955 by Walter Wotzke. When he moved to the old Lutheran School, the building became a delicatessen for a period. It has since been restored as a shop and gallery.

The former mortuary is one of only two remaining commercial premises built in stone, with a typical German half-hipped roof. Its original shingles are retained under the iron roof. The original loft and cellar also remain.

Shop (former Australian Arms Hotel)**46 Main Street, Hahndorf****SHR 10510 – confirmed as a State Heritage Place 24 July 1980***Shop, March 2005*

The Australian Arms Hotel was originally constructed as the Union Hotel, and was first licensed to Gottlieb Andreas Schuetze in 1854. In the early 1860s the licence was transferred to the new building across the road (now the Hahndorf Inn).

This building, which has been a residence for many years, has a steeply pitched half-roof, with attic windows. It is typical of the early German building style used in Hahndorf, being red gum half-timbering, with wattle and daub infill panels.

Jaensch House, Shop & Dwelling**47 Main Street, Hahndorf****SHR 13137 – confirmed as a State Heritage Place****14 August 1986**

The Jaensch family settled in Hahndorf in 1839, and for many years was one of the settlement's most prosperous families. J. Christian Jaensch Jnr. established one of Hahndorf's first butcher's shops on these premises, in a room at the northern end of the building.

*Corner shop, 2005***Two-storey Shop & Dwelling****51 Main Street, Hahndorf****SHR 10487 – confirmed as a State Heritage Place 23 September 1982***Two-storey shop & dwelling, 2005*

This typically German building, sited with its gable to the street, was built in the 1850s, on land originally granted to Joseph Renfrey. In the 1860s watchmaker August Christoph was the first registered owner. It later became a cobbler's shop and for sometime shared the premises with a dressmaker. The shop has changed little since the 1920s when it became the village delicatessen, established by Olive Post, and later a sweets shop owned by her daughter, Betty Gleggett.
