THEBARTON MOUNTED POLICE BARRACKS PORT ROAD ADELAIDE

HERITAGE SIGNIFICANCE

<u>Historically</u>, the item is representative of the rise and subsequent decline of the Mounted Police as a valued tool of law enforcement. As the North Terrace Barracks site represents the foundation and development of the force in the nineteenth century, so the Thebarton site performs a similar function for the twentieth.

<u>Architecturally</u>, the complex consists of a group of brick buildings juxtaposed around a parade ground. Original homogeneity was achieved by sympathetic scale, function and style.

Environmentally, the complex is an intrusion into the original parklands, but its law and order function is in keeping with the nearby Adelaide Gaol.

The Integrity, of the complex has been compromised by 1930's and 1950's additions. The original 1917 structures are in good condition.

NOMINATION SOURCE AND THREAT

This report has been prepared in response to a request from the Police Department for an assessment of the complex's heritage significance prior to planning the long-term future of the site. The item is owned by the Crown and is under no short-term threat.

History and Sources

The South Australian Mounted Police Cadre, established in 1838, is the oldest of its type in Australia, and with the possible exception of the Royal Irish Mounted Constabulary created by Robert Peel, the oldest in the world.

The South Australian Cadre, originally consisting of only 10 mounted officers, was considered the elite of the force, performing specialist roles not deemed suitable for foot patrols, including crowd control, Bullion and prisoner escort. However, by the late 1930's the prestige and practical value of the mounted detachment had been largely eroded by the increasing use of the motor car for surveillance, pursuit, and transport roles. In the 1950's, the detachment was renamed the "Mounted Cadre", their role now being almost purely ceremonial as honour guards at official functions.

The mounted detachments were originally housed at the North Terrace Barracks; the Armoury, Barracks Section and Toilet Block being the only surviving structures. Their 59 years occupation there ceased in March 1917, when they moved to Thebarton. A new Barracks and Stables complex had been constructed on land adjacent to the Adelaide Gaol, and with its opening on 1 March, 1917, the Great War for one day at least took secondary priority in the citie's newspapers.

The land occupied by the Police Barracks had originally been vacant parkland, made available to the Police Force by the "Parklands Alteration Act", passed by State Parliament in 1917.

Construction work on the initial building group was completed in the same year at a total cost of 16,000 pounds. However, any doubts as to the financial justification of the venture were more than dispelled by the new site's greater size which afforded room for future expansion, and extensive exercise space for the Police Greys.

The original Building group, surrounded the Central Parade ground on three sides. Inclusive in this block were the Kitchen/Mess, Administrative Quarters, Dormitory, and for the equine residents, 2 Stable groups, Chaff Mill, Farriery, Saddery, excercise circuit and Quarantine Shed.

The Inspector's residence alone stood in relative isolation on the Eastern extremity of the site.

In 1922, a shelter shed was added to the South West corner of the Main Stable allowing horses to be groomed and saddled in open but sheltered conditions.

The next major construction projects began in 1935 with the erection of the Quartermaster's Store, behind the Saddlery. In 1937, two of the complex's largest facilities were proposed and completed, these being the Dormitory at the Northern face of the Parade ground and the Hospital, which was later to become Star Force Headquarters. The galvanized iron clad Gymnasium was similarly erected at this time.

In 1938-39 extensive additions were made to the kitchen block, including a lounge, larger Mess facilities, Class Room, Toilet Block, and a Billard Room where the former Dining Room had been situated.

The 1940's saw little notable alteration to the complex except the remodelling of the Gaol Road entrance. The next decade, however, saw renewed development with the undertaking of several additional buildings, predominantly of corrugated, iron clad

composition. Historically this period was a point of departure for the Barracks and its occupants, which is reflected in the site's architecture. The Patrol car has truly superseded the horse, and the timber/brick stables of old are replaced by iron and concrete garages, as are the Chaff Mill and water trough, by the petrol bowser and sump pit.

In 1951 these changes were reflected in the conversion of the old Chaff Mill into a Motor Mechanics Workshop, and 3 years later the old Stables annex adjacent to the Shelter Shed was incorporated into a galvanized iron Motor Transport workshop.

Further conversion on the automobiles behalf occured in 1958, as the two timber prefabricated wings neighbouring the kitchen block were demolished and replaced by the Traffic Division accomodation building.

Since this project, little structural addition of any note has occured. Accomodation policy has rather dictated that already existing buildings be re-utilized, and thus, many structures since 1958 have had several varying roles.

Supplementary Information


Adaptation: The present high degree of integrity of the group of 1917 buildings surrounding the parade ground warrants preservation, and could be enhanced by removing more recentaccretions. The buildings could be used for a variety of purposes with little external alteration. If the stables building is converted to another purpose, at least one representative stall/floor bay should be retained.

<u>Interpretation</u>: Although the complex is ideally located and suited for a major police historical interpretation centre, the North Terrace site might be preferable on historical grounds.

THEBARTON POLICE BARRACKS Off Port Road, West Park Lands

This complex is of considerable historical significance due to its illustration of the development of the South Australian Mounted Police, and its transition to motorised patrols.

Conceptually, the complex is intimately linked with the old Mounted Police Barracks Buildings located at the rear of the Museum off North Terrace, which were vacated by the Mounted Police in 1917 due to the erection of the new premises near Thebarton. As such the buildings, the subject of this evaluation, are the eventual result of the formation of the South Australian Mounted Police Cadre, established in 1838, the oldest of its type in Australia (and with the <u>possible</u> exception of Peel's Royal Irish Mounted Constabulary, the oldest in the world). The Mounted Cadre had played an important role in crowd control, bullion escort and prisoner escort, the police greys now being used to supplement foot patrols in the City and as honour guards at ceremonial functions.

The land now occupied by the Police Barracks had originally been vacant Park Land, made available to the Police Force by the "Park Lands Alteration Act", passed by State Parliament in 1917.

Construction work on the initial building group was completed in the same year at a total cost of 16,000. However, any doubts as to the financial justification of the venture were more than dispelled by the new site's greater size which afforded room for future expansion, and extensive exercise space for the Police Greys.

SOUTH AUSTRALIAN HERITAGE ACT, 1978

Entry of Items on the Register of State Heritage Items

There has been an increased community awareness of the need to protect those buildings and features of our State which reflect our cultural heritage. The South Australian Government has recognised that awareness by passing the South Australian Heritage Act, 1978, for which the Minister for Environment and Planning is responsible. In accordance with the provisions of the Act, the Register of State Heritage Items is being compiled.

Where the Minister considers that an item (defined as any land, building or structure) that is not on the Register is part of the physical, social or cultural heritage of the State and that the item is of significant aesthetic, architectural, historical or cultural interest, then the Minister may enter that item on the Register.

Pursuant to the provisions of the South Australian Heritage Act, 1978, I, Don Hopgood, Minister for Environment and Planning and Minister for the time being administering the said Act, hereby give notice that. I have entered on the Register of State Heritage Items and the items described in The Schedule hereunder.

Items listed in The Schedule were previously placed on an Interim List in accordance with the provisions of section 15 of the South Australian Heritage Act, 1978. Excepting items owned by the Crown and those within the area of the corporation of the city of Adelaide, the remaining items listed in The Schedule are subject to Part V of the Planning Act, 1982. That Act requires that no development, including demolition, conversion, alteration of, or addition to any item, is permitted without the written consent of the relevant Planning Authority. Items within the area of the corporation of the city of Adelaide are subject to the provisions of the City of Adelaide Development Control Act, 1976.
