

HOUSE,  
17 Tynte Street, North Adelaide.

This house is historically significant, primarily because of its association with the printer David Gall. Gall arrived in the colony c1850; in 1855, he joined the printing business of Hussey & Shawyer, and eventually took it over. For sixteen years to 1881, he published the monthly COMET in which he championed the cause of protection for local industry. He was an active member of the Chamber of Manufactures. In 1851, this was a simple two-roomed cottage; it was extended by Gall in 1866. Thus, it reflects the prosperity of Gall, and the piecemeal development of much of the residential accommodation in North Adelaide.

The building is important for its relatively early date and its form and detailing which are evocative of the simplicity and symmetry of the late Georgian period. The facade to Tynte Street is severe, the central arched window lacking the visual strength for a dominant compositional centre piece. The building is nevertheless distinctive with  $\frac{1}{2}$  paned French doors and quality brick dressings which are reminiscent of the building at the corner of Barton Terrace and Jeffcott Street. It is well constructed of limestone rubble with raised brick dressings and an unusually finely detailed cornice. The accommodation at the rear is of little interest although it dates from at least 1880. The joinery to the facade would appear to have been replaced at some time prior to 1967, the Smith Survey indicating a verandah of more simple design than the present erection.

The environmental significance of this item is high. Its scale, setback and general distinctiveness ensure that it makes a positive contribution to the streetscape, and reinforces the essential residential character of the area.

The integrity of the item appears to be high. Several additions are apparent, but these represent legitimate development and enhance the significance of the item.
